Updates to our FOIPP Agreement



Under our new Agency Contract with the Government of Alberta, our program will be required to upload our day home visit checklist to the Child Care Licensing Portal for our licensing office to view.

Through this Portal the information reviewed under the day home standards checklist, completed during the home visits, will be reviewed by the Alberta Ministry of Jobs, Economy & Trade and the Child Development Branch Licensing Officers designated to this licensed agency.

Please know that this information is released on a confidential basis to be used only for the purpose it was disclosed.

All records collected are subject to the provision of the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy, referred to as the "FOIPP" Act.

What does this all mean...?

When parents and educators signed on with our program, everyone agreed that their information would be shared with our licensing officers to ensure that the Agency is meeting their legal obligations under the Standards and our contract (see your agency agreements for this clause) — this meant that at any time we could be requested to send this information to our Licensing Officer or they could come retrieve it from our office.

Now, this information will be provided to licensing monthly and they will no longer need to request it of the agency.



Christmas, Hanukkah & Kwanzaa: Creating an Inclusive Celebration



Multiculturalism and the Holidays

It's important to create an environment where all of the children feel welcome and represented. While teaching a multicultural curriculum may not be too challenging most of the year, December brings the holidays, when one or two holidays are usually much more visible than the others.

If done well, an inclusive holiday celebration can help children learn about diversity. Each child and

their family will celebrate the holidays differently. Although not everyone who celebrates Christmas associates the holiday with its religious origins, it's important to keep in mind that by choosing to celebrate only certain holidays, you could be excluding some of the families. In other words, if you'll be celebrating Christmas, make sure to carve out equal time during the year to devote to all holidays of major importance.

Examples include Diwali, the Hindu festival of lights that usually takes place in October or November; Bodhi Day in December, which marks the day
Buddhists celebrate the
enlightenment of
Siddhartha Gautama;
Kwanzaa, which
celebrates African heritage
in late December through
early January; and Yule, a
pagan holiday in honor of
the winter solstice.

Hanukkah, while celebrated around Christmas time, is not equal in importance to the major Christian holiday. Yom Kippur and Rosh Hashanah, which happen in the fall, are the holiest days for Jews. Ramadan, too, does not always fall in December, but it is the holiest month for Muslims. It's also


important to keep in mind that some religions do not celebrate any holidays, such as Jehovah's and Seventh Day Adventists.

When you're exposing children to cultural traditions they may not be familiar with (and which you may not be either), it's important to avoid cliches and harmful stereotypes.

Just like no two families who celebrate Christmas are exactly alike, the same goes for those who celebrate non-Christian holidays. So do your research and talk with the families about what and how they celebrate the holiday season.








